How we started



The Actors Training Center began in the summer of 2006 above the Historic Wilmette Theatre with 7 young actors.

With a primary focus on professionally training an overlooked demographic, the young actor, ATC creatively crafted classes that bridged the gap between training and a very competitive industry expectation.

In the last 17 years, The Actors Training Center (ATC) has become a nationally recognized acting school that Agents, Casting Directors, and Producers have come to rely on and a place that parents trust. Young actors thrive at ATC because they know they are in a safe place to explore who they are and are encouraged to use their special uniqueness in their work.

We make a habit of revisiting our class offerings every session and brainstorming on new and exciting ways to support our student's learning journey in an ever-changing industry.

Scholarships

No student is turned away

The Actors Training Center is an Illinois not-for-profit 501c3 corporation that has never turned a student away, no matter their race, gender, ethnicity, sexual identity, demographic or socioeconomic position. Our scholarships provide access to artistic journeys with awards of \$10k-\$12k given annually to students in need.

Outreach

We got serious about Outreach this year

It has been a dream of founder Carole Dibo to offer the unique and carefully crafted programs that ATC offers to young artists who dream of a career in the arts but can least afford it.





Summer in the City

This summer, we hosted 8 Chicago teens for our inaugural Summer in the City (SITC) program. SITC was completely funded by ATC's generous donors. The students spent two days at a rented studio space in Ravenswood learning on-camera skills, acting technique and improv and had professional actor headshots taken. On day three, they had lunch at the infamous Petterinos and then headed over to the Goodman Theatre to see a matinee of **Tommy** the Musical. After the show, our students were invited backstage for a talkback with Ali Louis Bourzgui, who played Tommy. The only criticism we heard was that the program wasn't long enough!

Embarc

Since 2021 ATC has been a proud partner of Embarc Chicago. By teaming up with Embarc Chicago, ATC is able to serve schools in economically disadvantaged communities by bringing over 165 students annually to our studios twice a month.





Areas of study

The Actors Training Center has four areas of study.

Musical Theatre – Storytelling through music and lyrics

Professional musical theatre classes are offered to all students from our youngest actors to graduating seniors. ATC fills the professional gap that school programs leave. Dance Styles and So You Think You Can't Dance help actors who struggle with movement while Acting The **Song** teaches how to make lyrics tell the story.

Our winter and summer productions are thoughtfully chosen, with attention paid to theme, messaging, and skill building. Summer 2023 brings productions of Pippin and Into the Woods Jr.

Many ATC students find themselves on Chicago professional stages such as the Marriott Lincolnshire and Drury Lane. Our alum have graced Broadway stages as well.





Comedy and Improv – We say "yes and..."

After taking a pandemic hiatus, we are thrilled to announce that our performing improv troupe, No Explanation, established in 2011, has returned! Improvisation teaches creativity, collaboration, and critical thinking. Many of our past **No Explanation** cast members have gone on to study comedy and writing in college and are working in L.A. as scriptwriters and actors.

Areas of study

On Camera Youth-Adult - Our on-camera classes continue to be a cornerstone of ATC

From ages eight to 80, our students have a plethora of choices from one to two days workshops with Casting Directors, Agents, and Directors to 6-8 week classes for the novice or more advanced students with our team of working professional actors.

Our focus on reaching students 18+ has paid off. Each of our adult classes in the first and second quarter of 2023 reached our maximum of 12 students.

We had several quest artists teach on-camera classes in 2023. L.A. Casting Director Deborah Dion, Chicago Casting Director/PR Casting, AJ Links, NY Casting Director Julie Schubert, Laura Alexander of Chicago's Talent X Agency, and Jenny Wilson, youth agent at Stewart Talent





Acting – Doing the hard work

Teaching vulnerability and the confidence to be vulnerable is a challenging task for any acting instructor. It requires a patient mentor who can create a safe environment where students can believe in their own abilities.

We are delighted to share that several of our acting students have successfully booked professional jobs on popular shows like Chicago Med and Chicago PD, as well as in various commercials. Additionally, our students have been recognized for their talent on prestigious stages, such as The Goodman Theatre, Paramount, and Chicago Shakespeare. These opportunities often arise because the staff at ATC is frequently asked for actor recommendations, which is a testament to the quality of training our students receive.

Our staff




Where we are going




